• Health systems use data to predict behavioral health risks: As the healthcare system shifts payment models to favor comprehensive care, more stakeholders are looking for new tools that offer strategic advantages. One such tool is large-scale data analysis. Data analysis, for example, might help to predict a patient's risk of depression in advance so clinicians can address it early and possibly offer referrals to behavioral health providers long before the condition becomes severe. According to Karen Handmaker, vice president of population health strategies for IBM, such predictive modeling is valuable to medical systems and primary care providers that are increasingly being reimbursed based on comprehensive care. - Key Findings from the 2015 National Survey on Drug Use and Health (NSDUH) On September 8, the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) released its annual Key Substance Use and Mental Health Indicators in the United States, using data from the 2015 National Survey on Drug Use and Health (NSDUH). For 2015, the report found that 17.9 percent of adults (43.4 million) experienced some form of mental illness and 4.0 percent (9.8 million) had a serious mental illness (SMI). In addition, roughly 34.2 million adults received mental health services in 2015, including 6.4 million adults with SMI. SAMHSA found that some forms of substance use continued to decrease from 2002 rates, including tobacco use and underage alcohol use. However, approximately 21.7 million individuals aged 12 years and older were in need of substance use treatment and only 2.3 million received treatment at a specialty facility. - HHS awards more than \$44.5 million to expand the nation's behavioral health workforce: The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) announced more than \$44.5 million in awards to training programs to increase the number of mental health providers and substance abuse counselors across the country. The Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) and the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) are funding 144 new and continuing grants through the Behavioral Health Workforce Education and Training (BHWET) program, which supports clinical internships and field placements for an array of professional and paraprofessional behavioral health disciplines and occupations.
