According to NBHP’s By-laws, membership criteria are as follows:

“The membership shall be composed of Executive Directors, Chief Executive Officers, and Presidents of behavioral health entities. In the case of a hospital, general practice clinic, or university, the highest administrator in the behavioral health division shall be eligible. Upon NBHP Board approval, the CEO may designate a high-level behavioral health administrator as the organization’s representative. The behavioral health entity shall have been in operation for a minimum of two years, shall be licensed or utilize licensed professional staff, and shall serve indigent populations. Other organizations shall be considered for membership if they can substantially further the purpose of the organization and are approved by the membership. The direction and management of the affairs of the organization shall be vested in the membership. Member organizations shall ensure attendance at meetings, pay annual dues and continue to meet the criteria for membership.”

Statement of Agreement

The Network of Behavioral Health Providers, Inc. (NBHP), a 501(c)(3) organization, was formed in 2004 to provide a forum for the leadership of Houston's mental health and substance use service providers, both public and private, to communicate, coordinate, and collaborate to support and strengthen the community's behavioral health system.

The membership of NBHP is composed of behavioral health agency Chief Executive Officers (unless the institution is multi-disciplinary, such as a hospital or university, in which case the highest administrator in the behavioral health division will serve). Criteria for membership include being in operation for at least two years, a licensed facility or utilizing licensed professional staff, and providing indigent care. NBHP members shall provide behavioral health services without discrimination on account of sex, race, color, religion, marital status, economic status, sexual orientation, gender identity, age, ancestry or national origin, health status, or source of payment.

We, the undersigned, agree as follows:

1. To support the collaborative alliance formally organized as a Texas nonprofit corporation whose corporate name is The Network of Behavioral Health Providers, Inc.
2. To ensure that NBHP is an effective structure for cross-agency communication, coordination, and collaboration.
3. To participate in NBHP through attendance at meetings, involvement in committee work, collaboration on mutually beneficial program projects, and payment of annual dues (\$5,000 for agencies whose behavioral health budget expenditures exceed \$25,000,000, \$3,500 for those whose budgets are between \$10,000,000 and \$25,000,000, \$2,200 for those whose budgets are between \$5,000,000 and \$10,000,000, \$1,600 for those whose budgets are between \$1,000,000 and \$5,000,000, \$1,100 for those whose budgets are between \$500,000 and \$1,000,000, and \$600 for agencies with less than \$500,000 in behavioral health expenditures).
4. To invite other behavioral health agencies to join NBHP within the criteria established by the organization.
5. To support the goals of NBHP. Specific goals are to:
 - Collaborate in resource development.
 - Bridge the division between mental health and substance use disorder services.
 - Bring about an improvement in:
 - Quality and appropriateness of services
 - Access to more than just crisis services



- o Expansion and enhancement of services
 - o Supportive services
 - Become a spokesperson for the people we serve.
 - Advocate for behavioral health research (in partnership with local academic research institutions).
 - Create partnerships across providers for service delivery.
 - Identify issues to be taken to a larger audience.
 - Commit to quality services inclusive of supportive services vital for recovery.
 - Advocate for world-class services and support.
 - Reduce the stigma of mental illness and substance use disorders.
 - Establish behavioral health as equally important to physical health.
 - Raise sufficient funds to cover the expenses of the collaborative.
6. To promote a productive and harmonious relationship among the member agencies by maintaining effective channels of communication. At present, the business of NBHP is conducted by the full membership at regularly scheduled meetings. The full group discusses NBHP's progress as an entity and on specific projects, opportunities for collaboration, barriers to success and how to overcome them, and other matters of common concern. A Board of Directors, composed of a Chair, Immediate Past Chair, Vice Chair, Secretary, Treasurer, chairs of the standing committees, and two at large members, has been formed. Specific tasks will be delegated to appropriate committees for discussion and recommendations and be reported back to the full group for action. Any formal documents including position papers will be distributed only after being made available for review by the entire membership. Written notice of the intention to distribute documents on behalf of the membership will be made via email along with attached copies of said document and the stated deadline for responses.
7. To seek to ensure that NBHP exerts a significant positive and long-lasting impact on the provision of mental health and substance use disorder services in the Greater Houston Area.

Any participating agency may withdraw from NBHP with 30 days' written notice to the Chair of the Board of Directors. A participating agency may be asked to withdraw from NBHP at any time that the membership, after review by the Board of Directors, determines that it is not in keeping with the goals of NBHP. In either case, dues will not be refunded.

It is recognized that NBHP's goals are stated in general terms, allowing the entity flexibility in its ability to respond to emerging needs, yet-to-be identified concerns, and crisis situations. In agreeing to the terms of participation, members acknowledge that they are committing to participate in the continuing evolution of the group. This agreement may be amended as necessary to reflect changes in NBHP's goals and/or structure.
